The Next 100 SGAA Conferences


With this issue of *The Stained Glass Quarterly*, we celebrate the 101st Stained Glass Association of America Annual Summer Conference.

This year's summer conference, held in Kansas City, marks another milestone in this organization — the beginning of the second century of conferences for the members of this 107-year-old organization.

There were, obviously, six years when those conferences did not happen. In lieu of research concerning the specific reason they did not occur, I can only imagine the conditions which may preclude a Summer Conference from taking place.
