

# THE SGAA'S NEW WEB SITES

*The Association Takes a Multifaceted Approach to Its Online Presence*

The Stained Glass Association of America went online with its first website in early 1996, at the very beginning of what was to become the Internet equivalent of a land rush. Groups everywhere were staking out their online claims and beginning to explore and develop what was then still a very new medium.


The early SGAA website underwent several small revisions as the quickly expanding technology developed. Originally, [www.stainedglass.org](http://www.stainedglass.org) was a site primarily for *The Stained Glass Quarterly*; it presented sample feature articles taken from the magazine and provided contact information that people could use to subscribe.

As the immense potential and value of the Internet became more and more apparent, [www.stainedglass.org](http://www.stainedglass.org) was expanded to help the Association take advantage of this still-new medium. The first major revision in the website came when the SGAA's philosophy for its online presence evolved from a presentation of static pages to a more fully-developed site that represented the entire organization: magazine, membership, and school.

The SGAA's second-generation website presented a unified theme for all pages; this simplified navigation and made for a more professional appearance across the website.

The next major revision was not the result of a philosophy change but rather an evolution in website technology. New technologies were being developed, and the Association's website was redesigned from the ground up to take advantage of these innovations. It was at this time that Flash was first added to the website as a navigation component.

It was also at this time that *Sourcebook* was given its own site, [www.SGAAOnline.com](http://www.SGAAOnline.com). Though it had been online and downloadable for some

This interlinking is enhanced by a custom navigation interface that is common to all three sites. In addition to links to each of the Association's main pages and its Facebook presence, this navigation interface (seen at the top right of each main site) contains links to the most popular pages on the Association's sites.*

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time before it was moved to the new site, the new site allowed it to be fully developed; all *Sourcebook* content was made available online for free in several formats. Whether the user wanted to read the online Flash edition of the *Sourcebook*, download individual pages as PDF files, or view articles on their individual web pages, the new website accommodated their needs.

The newest website evolution comes once again with a complete shift in philosophy. No longer is the SGAA's online presence a collection of static html pages; instead, the organization's online presence is based around the concept of *content*. Instead of a collection of html pages, the SGAA's website consists of online databases that house content. When a user accesses that content, he does so through one of the Association's portals.

The *Stained Glass Quarterly* ([stainedglassquarterly.com](http://stainedglassquarterly.com)), the Stained Glass Association of America ([www.stainedglass.org](http://www.stainedglass.org)) and the SGAA Stained Glass School ([stainedglass.school.org](http://stainedglass.school.org)) each have an individual portal through which the user can find online content. The new approach is dynamic and multifaceted; it is database driven and makes full use of PHP technologies.

Though it is very complex in its nature, the visitor does not see this complexity. Instead, the visitor encounters a very usable interface with dynamic search capability, site maps, and multiple paths to find the desired content.

The Stained Glass Association of America's websites are designed to provide the user a positive experience and make finding the right information quick and easy, whether they are looking for one of our member studios, a history of stained glass, information on the next Annual Summer Conference, a place to subscribe to this magazine online in a safe and secure environment, or something else. The Association's websites are there to serve.
