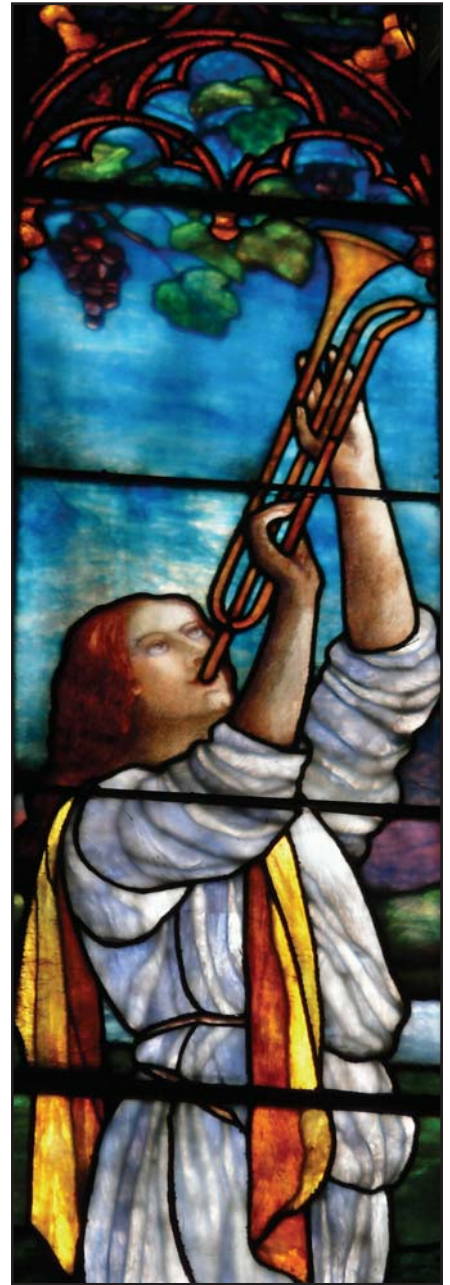
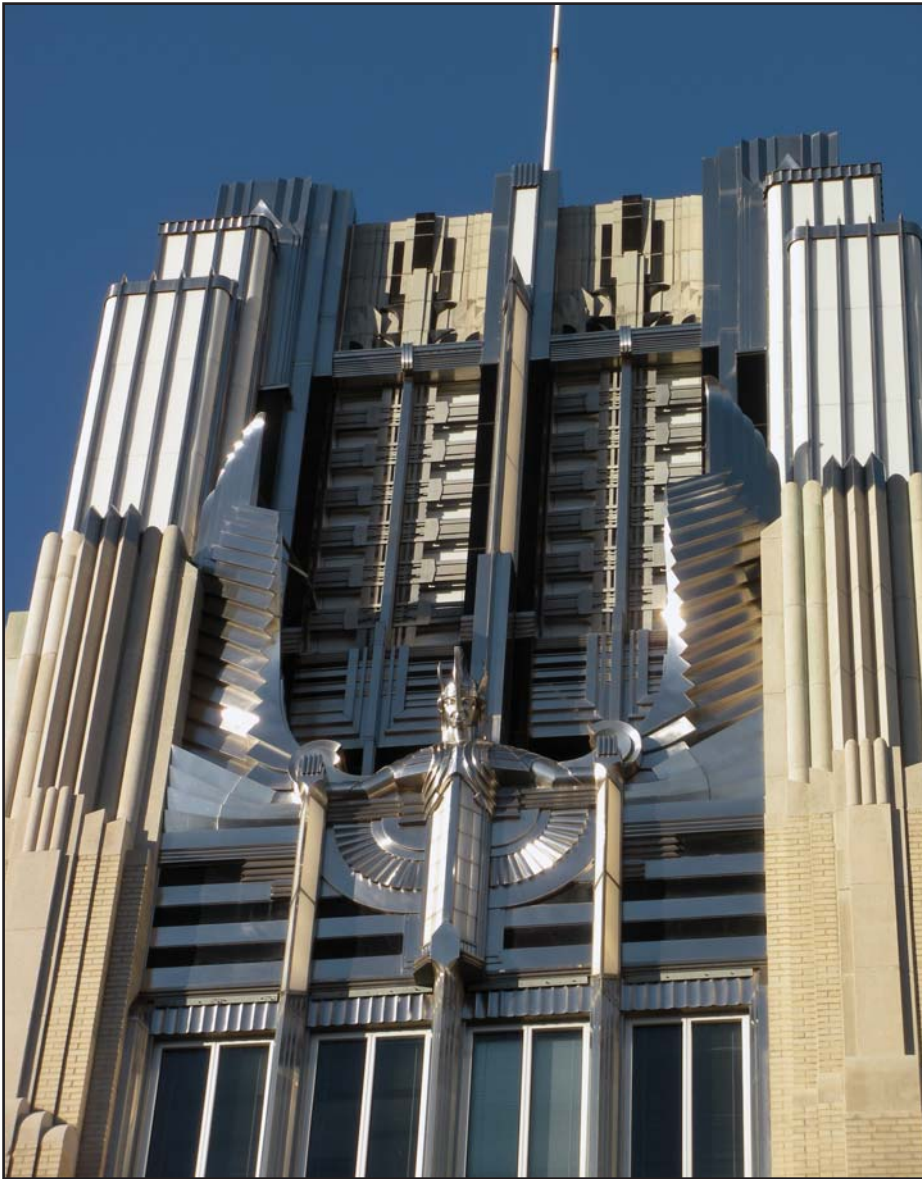


VISITING SYRACUSE

There's Plenty to See and Do



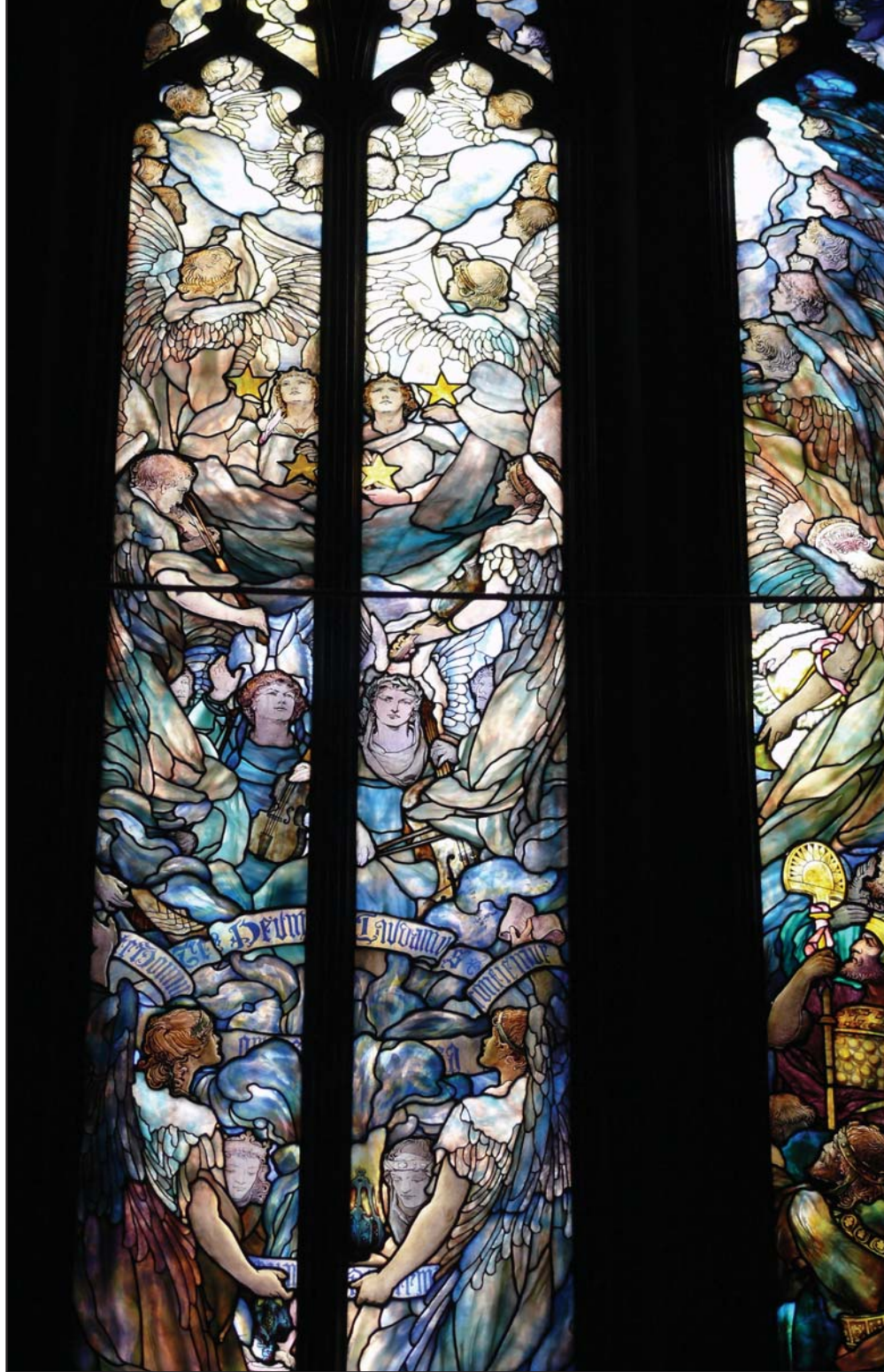

Syracuse is a small, walkable city. Most of downtown is within walking distance of the Official Conference Hotel for next summer's Annual Summer Conference of the Stained Glass Association of America.

The arts and architecture are all well represented in downtown Syracuse. Notable sites include the Everson Museum of Art, with its building designed by I.M. Pei. The MOST Museum, which houses an Imax theater and planetarium, is located in Armory Square, the center for restaurants and boutique shopping

Lighter lunchtime fare can be found at many popular restaurants around the city. These are prime-time rendezvous spots for quick business meetings as well as places to get a quick and tasty lunch.



The Crowne Plaza hotel (top left) is the official Conference hotel for the SGAA's 2011 Conference. It offers a spectacular view of downtown Syracuse from its top floor restaurant. This year's tour of area stained glass will highlight several of the area's most prominent installations, such as shown above.

Syracuse also has free shuttle service available to various sites of interest and the convention bureau will host a table answering visitors' questions at the Conference. They will be able to direct Conference attendees to some fabulous sights to see and can

even help arrange dinner reservations if necessary.

Syracuse is a short drive to the finger lakes and the Finger Lake Wine Trail. The beauty of the drive is not to be missed.
